- What are we talking about?
 - A non verbal or physical language
 - Special defined activities with its own universal language of rules and codes
 - A non formal or non cognitive way of learning
 - A very popular and fascinating activity which made it possible to motivate people and bring them together etc
 - A therapy for mentally handicapped people to communicate
 - A special language for spectators, marketing agents, media
 - Diversity of activities with its own culture and characteristics

180 million people once a week (38%)

70 million are member of a sport association

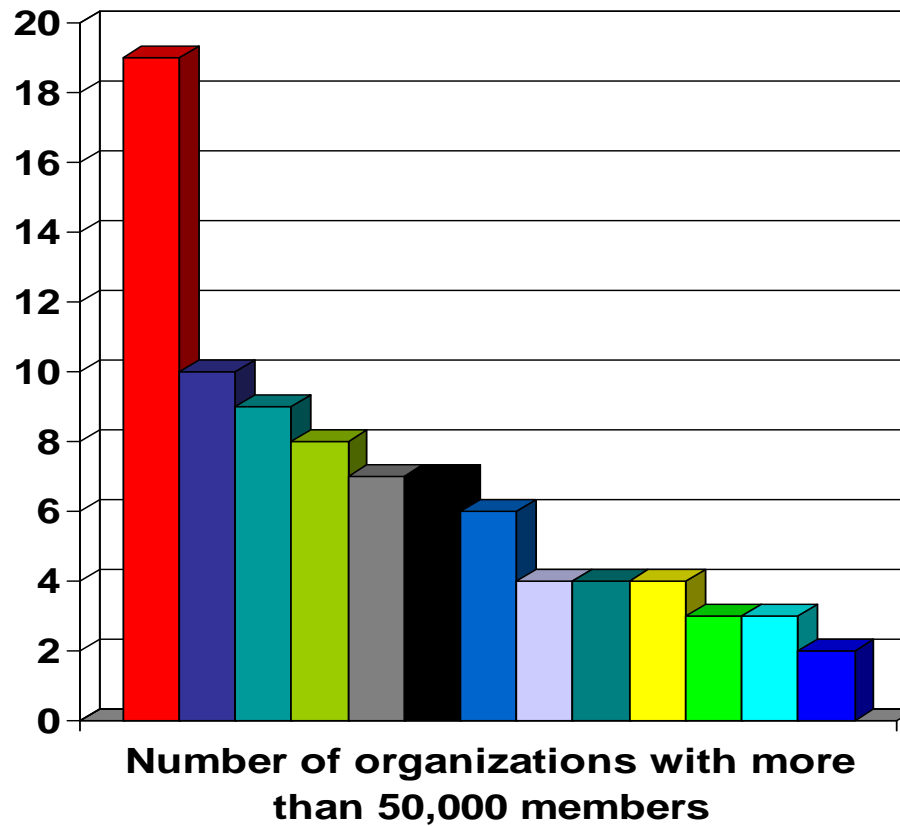

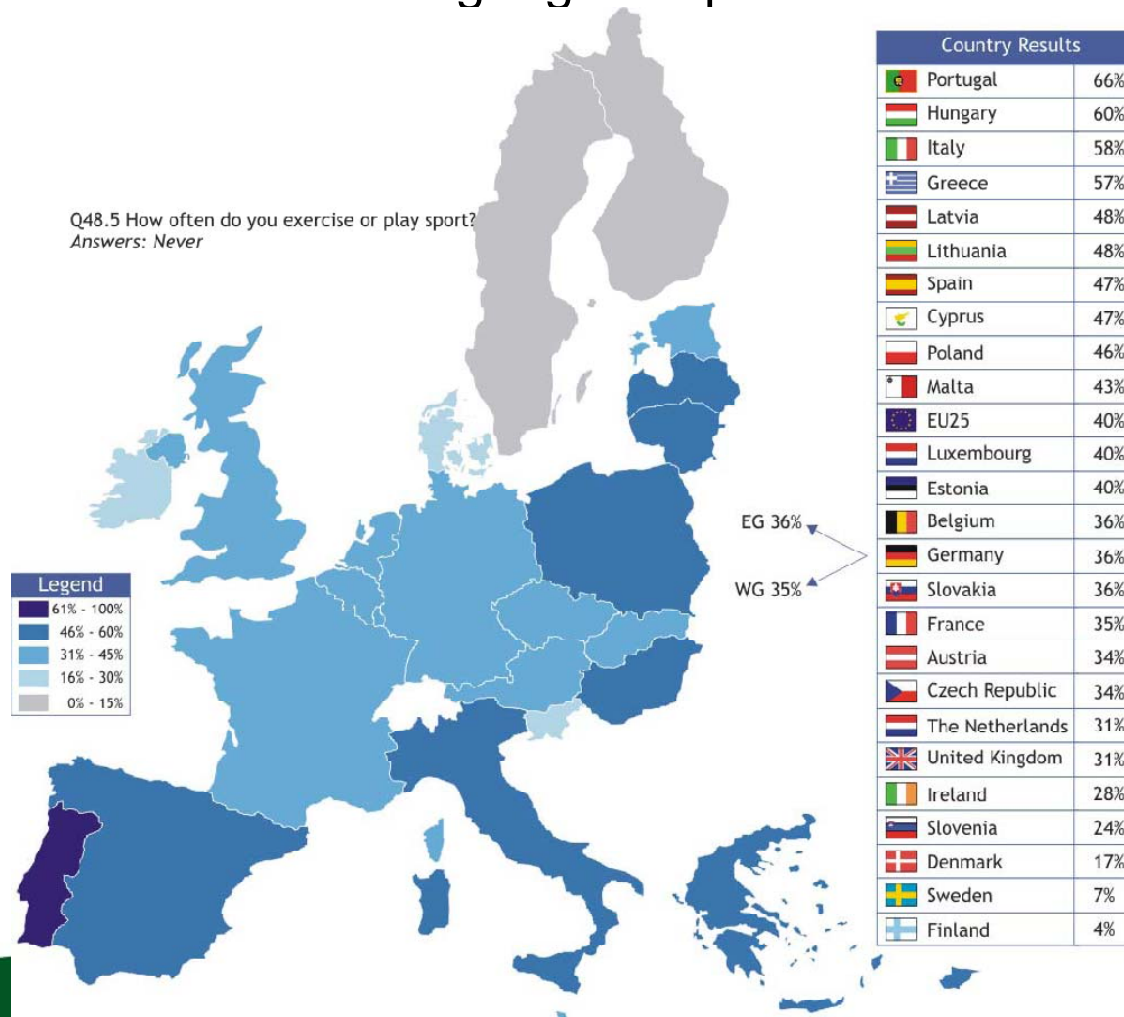

Preparatory Action 2009

- Providing policy support for the identification of future policy actions in the area of sport through studies, surveys, conferences and seminars
- Testing the establishment and functioning of suitable networks and good practices through [call for proposals](#)
- Budgetary line 2009 voted by European parliament: € 7,5 millions



Call for Proposals 2009

Objectives:

- Prepare future EU actions in this field
- Test suitable networks and good practices in the field of sport, in the following areas:
 - health-enhancing physical activity
 - education and training in sport
 - social inclusion of handicapped in sport
 - gender equality in sport





Lisbon Treaty

- A soft competence alongside education, vocational training and youth, (no directives, respect of subsidiarity)
- promote sporting issues by taking account of the specific nature of sport;
- develop a European dimension of sport by promoting fairness and openness in competitions, cooperation between bodies responsible for sport, and protecting physical and moral integrity of sportspersons.
- foster cooperation with third countries and international organisations.





Lisbon Treaty
